I hope 2024 is a good one for you all.



What an amazing start to the school year we have had in Room 32, exploring our new classroom and investigating ways to make it feel like our own space. Dear Parents/Guardians/carers,

I am excited to share with you an update on how our class, Room 35, has been progressing since the start of this school year.

Despite the hot weather and busy schedule, the students have been doing exceptionally well, settling into their new classroom, getting to know their teachers and EA's, and forming new friendships with each other.

In Room 35, we have implemented a formal and informal learning program. Our formal program focuses on key learning areas such as literacy and numeracy. During mat time, we use aligned songs and animations to introduce the concepts, followed by a structured three-stage learning sequence

at their desks, which includes hands-on warm-up activities, related activity sheets, and finishing with another hands-on learning activity such as a playdough smash, where students learn the beats/syllables in different words, or a playdough shape molding activity.

After each formal learning session, we follow up with an informal learning session involving arts and crafts, building, puzzles, and content-specific apps on the iPad.

The students enjoy the sit-down work time, knowing that they get to explore the concept areas in various hands-on learning stations

afterwards.

I am very proud of the students and how they have adjusted to their new routines, particularly during

their morning mat sessions. They have been doing an excellent job of adapting to the formal and informal learning activities, and I am excited to see their progress in the upcoming weeks.

Bunuru

SECOND SUMMER - FEBRUARY & MARCH - SEASON OF ADOLESCENCE

Bunuru is the hottest time of the year with little to no rain. Hot easterly winds continue with a cooling sea breeze most afternoons if you're close to the coast. Therefore, traditionally this was, and still is, a great time for living and fishing by the coast, rivers and estuaries. Because of this, freshwater foods and seafood made up major parts of the diet during this time of year.

Bunuru is also a time of the white flowers with lots of white flowering gums in full bloom, including Jarrah, Marri and Ghost Gums.

Another striking flower that is hard to go past is the female Zamia (Macrozamia riedlei), pictured here. Being much larger than that of its male counterpart, the huge cones emerge from the centre of the plant with masses of a cotton wool like substance.

As the hot, dry weather continues the seed upon the cones change from green to bright red, indicating they're ripening and becoming more attractive to animals, particularly the emu, that will eat the toxic fleshy outer.

A big thank you to all the parents and carers who made time for their children's IEP meetings.








So far this term, the students have enjoyed getting to go out to the bike track every Friday to practice their bike riding skills and have some active fun outside the classroom.

Welcome back to school. It has been a pleasure to meet you over the last few weeks and getting to know our students.


It has been a fabulous start to the year and everyone is settling into their new routines and have been applying themselves really well.
